

Forensic Interviewing of Crime Victims with Disabilities—This keynote will describe specific common barriers to achieving a successful interview and solutions to employ. Participants will learn how to best communicate with persons with intellectual disabilities or communication differences with resources that can improve this essential part of the victim's experience.

PLENARY 1 — Dr. Nora Baladerian, PhD, Disability, Abuse & Personal Rights Project, SPECTRUM INSTITUTE, Los Angeles, CA

Working with Victims of Crime Experiencing Mental Illness or Psychiatric Disabilities—Trauma or mental illness experienced during childhood or adolescence can disrupt key developmental processes, leaving victims at increased risk for victimization. Exposure to ongoing abuse can exacerbate symptoms and precipitate mental health crisis, making it more difficult for victims to interact with the criminal justice system, access resources, and recover from trauma.

PLENARY 2 — Beverly Franz, Ed.D., Institute on Disabilities at Temple University, Philadelphia, PA

What Did You Say? Do You Know What She Said? The Importance of Effective Communication within the Criminal Justice and Victim Services Systems—Current literature suggests that victims of crime who cannot communicate effectively are less likely to be able to prevent or report crimes, and less likely to access the criminal justice and victim service systems. This session will discuss several models for enhanced communication and demonstrate the "Validating Others Intentional Communicative Expression" (V.O.I.C.E.) protocol, to ensure that the voices of all victims are heard and understood accurately.

SESSION B1 —Dr. Nora Baladerian, PhD, Disability, Abuse & Personal Rights Project, Spectrum Institute, Los Angeles, CA

Risk Reduction Planning for Individuals with Disabilities—One of the hardest things to discuss with assault victims is the likelihood of another assault. Making a plan that can work for the individual when faced with "the next" attempt or completed assault is essential to their protection and mental health. The session will review a protocol that has led to successful outcomes.

SESSION B2 — Beverly Franz, EdD, Institute on Disabilities at Temple University, Philadelphia, PA

Creating an Accessible, Safe & Respectful Environment for Sexual Assault Victims with Disabilities—This session will present concepts and strategies for creating an accessible, safe, and respectful environment that helps in de-escalating crisis and managing a victim's anxiety by addressing issues of physical, programmatic and attitudinal accessibility. More than just a "check list," accessibility includes exploring stereotypes and the impact they have on crime victim service delivery.

SESSION B3—Monica Acord MA, Co-Director of the Child Advocacy Center, Greenbrier County, WV, Susan E. Vlajk, ACSW, LCSW, and Adam Martin, Detective, Greenbrier County Sheriff's Department

The MDIT Response—This session will follow a case of an adolescent with developmental disabilities through the judicial system. Participants will have an opportunity to learn from the perspectives of members of a multidisciplinary team.

SESSION B4 — Suzanne Messenger, Bureau of Senior Services

Guardianship101-This interactive session will be a general primer of the many issues that arise when one person has some authority to make decisions for a victim, such as, "What if a victim has a disability that impacts his/her ability to make decisions?" "What if the victim has a guardian?" "What role does the guardian have?" and "What decisions can be make for a victim?"

SESSION B5—Regina Mayola, Center for Excellence in Disabilities

Keeping Safe and Increasing Accessibility Using Assistive Technology—This session will explore various technologies used by persons with disabilities or with persons who are deaf. Participants will learn the benefits and crucial tips to increase safety and accessibility.

SESSION B6 — Marissa Johnson, Executive Director and Roy Foreman, Deputy Director, WV Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

"What Do You Do... if a victim of sexual violence comes to your office and they happen to be deaf or hard of hearing?" Do you know your rights and responsibilities for communicating with this person? Do you know what their rights and responsibilities are? This interactive session will provide an overview of technology options, a summary of rights and responsibilities, and best practices for supporting sexual violence victims who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Learning how to utilize this instrument to assess "consent to sex" will provide insights into how to assess with cultural, practical and sensitive techniques.

The Slippery Slope of Touch — This session will explore the dynamics and impact of touch. From healing to abusive; voluntary to mandated; and selling & buying in the context of social and medical models.
